

Foundation Stage Newsletter: Autumn Term 1

Dear Parents,

We would like to welcome you to Foundation Stage and we hope you enjoy it just as much as your child will. Our main focus for the first half term is to support children's emotional wellbeing by ensuring that your child settles into school and forms friendships to develop secure foundations and give them the best start to their time at Downsway Primary School.

Our first topic of the year is Marvellous Me!

We will start this term with the topic '**Marvellous Me**' which allows us to get to know each other. Our topic will change every half term and you will receive a topic map and newsletter to explain what your child will be learning at school. Our learning follows each child's individual needs and interests through planned play experiences linking to our topic, which makes learning active and meaningful. We also include seasonal and cultural learning themes that will help your child learn more about our world. During this topic we will be learning about our senses, our differences and similarities and how we have changed since we were babies. Further information can be found on the topic map.

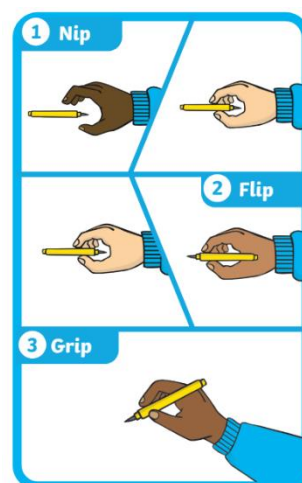
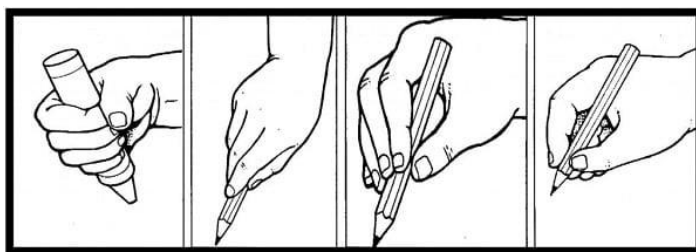
Dough Disco

Once we have all settled into school we will start daily Dough Disco sessions. Dough Disco is a fun activity which combines the use of Play-Doh with a series of hand and finger exercises designed to improve fine motor control in preparation for drawing and writing. The movements develop children's fine and gross motor dexterity, hand-eye coordination and self-esteem. The school will provide your child with their own pot of playdoh to take part in these sessions.



Literacy and Drawing Club

We will start the term focusing on developing our fine motor skills through lots of fun activities. The children will then build upon these skills and develop their pencil grip and begin to make marks using lines and shapes. We will begin to teach children to hold a mark making tool with a modified tripod grasp moving onto a tripod grasp using the following rhyme: nip, flip and grip (see images).

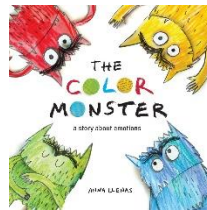


We will initially focus on forming shapes and patterns using different mark making tools before moving onto letter formation and focus on writing our names. In Foundation Stage we teach children print handwriting. We will be teaching children how to form the letters of the alphabet as they are taught in our phonics scheme. As the year progresses we will also learn about capital letters and how to form them.

We will be using fiction and non-fiction texts to support children's understanding of what makes us special, our families, different homes and feelings/emotions:



Later in the term we will start 'Drawing Club' in our literacy sessions. Drawing Club immerses children in the world of story and shows them the joy of drawing and writing. It enables adults to share a treasure trove of vocabulary with children. It also gives children age-appropriate drawing and mark making/writing practice that is highly engaging and grounds children in the joy of book snuggling. We will focus on a new story or animation every week and introduce new vocabulary (six new words linking to the text) with exciting actions to help the children remember the words. The children will then be set challenges to draw pictures to go with the story and add passcodes linking to phonics and maths concepts to make their drawings come to life.



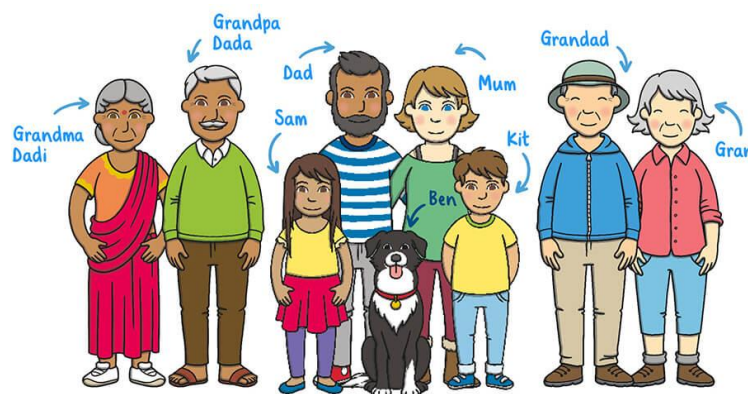
We will also start using the school library once the children are settled into school. Children will visit the library in small groups with a member of staff from the Foundation Stage team. They will have time to look through the selection of age appropriate books and select one to borrow for a week. Our library slot is on a Thursday afternoon. Once your child starts bringing library books home please ensure they are brought back in their bookbag every Thursday so it can be returned for a new one.

Linking to our focus texts 'Only One You' and 'Incredible You' we will be celebrating how we are all different and how that makes us special. We will be sending an 'All About Me' bag home with your child to fill with three objects that represents their likes/dislikes and things that are important to them. Children will have an opportunity to share these with their friends and adults in school. We will then send the bags and objects home. We can't wait to see what everyone brings in!



Phonics

At Downsway Primary School we follow a scheme called Twinkl Phonics. Twinkl Phonics is a fully comprehensive, synthetic phonics teaching programme designed to be used with children in line with both the EYFS Framework and National Curriculum. Delivered through the stories and adventures of Kit, Sam and the Twinkl Phonics family, the scheme builds and develops the skills and understanding children need to become effective, independent readers and writers. Further information about how to support your child at home will be sent to you once your child starts bringing reading books home.



The children will take part in daily phonics sessions to develop their reading (blending) and segmenting (writing) skills. We will also use fun interactive phonics games during the school day to help the children practise their phonics skills and build on their understanding. Mathematical Development

Children will build on previous experiences of number from their home and nursery environments and further develop their subitising (when you are able to look at a group of objects and realise how many there are without counting) and counting skills. We will practise oral counting and explore the sequence of events, such as the school day. The children will explore the composition of numbers within 5 and use numberblocks to develop their understanding further. They will begin to compare sets of objects and use the language of comparison. Children will also develop their understanding of shapes, identify 2D shapes and finding them in the environment.

Reception Baseline Assessment

The reception baseline assessment (RBA) is a short, interactive and practical assessment of your child's early literacy, communication, language and mathematics skills when they begin in school. It will be undertaken by Mrs Clarke and Mrs Tipper and will measure your child's progress from Foundation to Year 6. The data will only be accessed by the Department for Education. Mrs Clarke and Mrs Tipper will spend quality 1-1 time with your child, getting to know them and if they need any further support in certain areas.

Things to remember

- **Children are allowed to wear home clothes on the Friday after their birthday.**
- Please make sure all items of school uniform and PE kit are named as items of clothing can easily be mixed up.
- **Please bring in a named pair of wellington boots for your child to use in the mud kitchen, water play and in wet weather.**
- Please bring your child's book bag into school every day with their reading book/reading record (once these are given out later in the term).
- If you are providing a packed lunch for your child please remember that nuts and nut products are not allowed in school.
- Named water bottles should be brought into school every day filled with water (no squash or juice please).
